Students are expected to:

- Follow the 2 compulsory courses on methods: “Statistical Methods for Social Sciences” in the first semester and “Qualitative Methods” in the second semester.
- Select at least 2 out of the 4 compulsory courses: “Global Governance and Regulation”, “Applying Organisation Theories to Practice”, “Gender and International Affairs”, and “International Policy Analysis”. Students without a background on International Relations or Political Science are strongly advised to take “Global Governance and Regulation”. If any of the other compulsory courses are taken in addition to the 2 required they will be credited as free electives.
- Choose one track as a Major among the tracks offered in the MIA: Global Security, Trade and International Finance, and Environment, Resources and Sustainability. In each track, there are two compulsory courses from which students should take one. In addition, they should obtain 18 credits of elective courses within the track. If the other compulsory course in the track is taken in addition to the one required, it will count towards the 18 credits of elective courses required within the track.
- Choose one track as a Minor among the tracks offered either in the MIA, other than the one chosen as the Major, or those offered in addition in the MDEV (Power, Conflict and Development, and Mobilities, Spaces and Cities), or the Minor offered on Global Health. Students should obtain 12 credits of courses within the Minor, be they compulsory or elective. Students will be asked to identify the Major and the Minor that they have chosen before the beginning of the second semester.
- Obtain 12 credits in workshops, 18 credits in disciplinary or interdisciplinary elective courses which students can choose freely, complete a capstone project for 9 credits, and produce a thesis for 18 credits. Students can also validate an internship for 3 credits. If they choose not to do so, they are required to obtain an additional 3 credits of free elective courses.

Students are required to:

- Follow the 2 compulsory courses on methods: “Statistical Methods for Social Sciences” in the first semester, and Social Inquiry and Qualitative Methods for Development in the second semester.
- Take at least 2 out of the 4 compulsory courses: “Economics of Development”, “Gender and Development: From Theory to Practice”, “History, Theory and Practice of Development”, and “Poverty and Inequality”. Students without a background on Economics are strongly advised to take “Economics of Development”. If any of the other compulsory courses are taken in addition to the 2 required they will be credited as free electives.
- Choose one track as a Major among the tracks offered in the MDEV: Power, Conflict and Development, Mobilities, Spaces and Cities, or Environment, Resources and Sustainability. Students having entered in autumn 2017 are expected to:

- Complete any remaining compulsory courses.
- Complete the course requirement for the Major in the chosen track. In each track there is either one compulsory course or a choice of two courses from which students should take one. In addition, students should obtain 18 credits of elective courses within the track. If the other compulsory course in the track, when available, is taken in addition to the one required, it will count towards the 18 credits of elective courses required within the track.
- Complete the course requirement for the Minor chosen in the MDEV (for which they need to take a compulsory course and another 6 credits of elective courses in the track over the course of their studies).
- Achieve the 12 credits in workshops, 12 credits in disciplinary or interdisciplinary elective courses which they can choose freely, complete in the first semester the capstone project they have started in the spring semester of this year for 9 credits, and produce a thesis for 18 credits.
- Students can also validate an internship for 3 credits. If they choose not to do so, they are required to obtain an additional 3 credits of free elective courses.

Master in Anthropology and Sociology

Le master en anthropologie et sociologie est un programme destiné aux étudiants intéressés par l'étude comparée des problèmes globaux par-delà les frontières nationales ainsi que l'opposition entre centre et périphérie. Il examine de façon critique les relations internationales et le développement dans le but de questionner les visions totalisantes de la globalisation et la division conventionnelle entre le Nord et le Sud. Les enseignements du programme abordent les perspectives théoriques et outils méthodologiques de l'anthropologie et de la sociologie permettant aux étudiants d'explorer une variété de thématiques clés: le développement; l'État et la gouvernance internationale; la violence et les conflits; les relations rurales-urbaines; les migrations; la santé globale et la biomédecine; le droit, le marché et l'emploi; l'inégalité; le genre; l'environnement; la politique des images.

The Master in Anthropology and Sociology is a programme designed for students interested in the comparative study of global issues across national borders and beyond the opposition between centre and periphery. It examines in a critical way international relations and development with the goal of questioning totalising views of globalisation and the conventional North-South divide. Courses in the programme engage with theoretical approaches and methodological tools in anthropology and sociology in order to enable students to explore several key themes: development; the state and international governance; violence and conflict; rural-urban relations; migration; global health and biomedicine; law, market and labour; inequality; gender; environment; the politics of images.

Les étudiants en master qui souhaitent emprunter la filière rapide de doctorat doivent obtenir les 90 crédits d'enseignement requis par le plan d'études au terme du troisième semestre d'études; ils ne devront donc pas suivre le «Writing Workshop (MA Thesis)» réservé aux seuls étudiants finissant leur programme de master. En revanche, ils devront participer au «Doctoral Research Seminar I» lors de leur troisième semestre de master.

Les étudiants ont la possibilité d'effectuer, au cours de leur troisième semestre d'études, un semestre d'échange hors les murs dans l'une de nos universités partenaires. Ils peuvent alors transférer un maximum de 30 crédits ECTS.

Each student is allowed to spread out the elective courses over semesters 1 to 4, but must take into account the following points:

- students must take a certain number of courses in their discipline of specialisation and in complementary disciplines;
- it is obligatory for students to obtain a minimum of 18 ECTS credits each semester;
- courses failed during the fourth semester of studies cannot be repeated.

MA students interested in the doctoral fast track must obtain the 90 course credits required by the curriculum by the end of the third semester; these students should therefore not take the "Writing Workshop (MA Thesis)" reserved for students finishing the master programme. They should, however, participate in the "Doctoral Research Seminar I" in the third semester of the master programme.

Students have the opportunity to spend their third semester at one of the Institute's partner universities as part of its exchange programmes. At the end of this period abroad, they will be able to transfer a maximum of 30 ECTS credits.

The complementary courses are the ones that ANSO students can choose from another disciplinary department or in the MIA and MDEV curricula, only if they are open to the ANSO department and subject to places being available. More specifically, students will be able to register to these courses online via Campus. These courses shouldn't be confused with courses taken outside of the curricula ("hors-plan" courses), which are usually not opened to the ANSO department, or courses taken in another academic institution (out of exchange programmes). ANSO students can register to these courses with formal dispensation, under the condition of not exceeding a cumulative total of 12 ECTS (on the whole four semesters) and getting authorisation from the Direction of Studies via a form available in the internet Student Portal.

Doctorat en anthropologie et sociologie

PhD in Anthropology and Sociology

Faisant suite au master de l'Institut ou à un master d'une autre institution académique, le programme de doctorat est conçu sur une durée maximale de quatre années. Au cours de leurs études, les doctorants devront obtenir 24 crédits d'enseignement et défendre un mémoire préliminaire de thèse, avant d'effectuer une recherche de terrain puis de rédiger leur thèse de doctorat.

The PhD programme is designed to take a maximum of four years after the Institute's master programme or a related master programme from another academic institution. During their doctoral studies, candidates are required to obtain 24 course credits and defend a preliminary thesis dissertation before completing fieldwork and writing their doctoral thesis.

Master en droit international Master in International Law

Au cours de leur master en droit international, les étudiants acquièrent les compétences et les connaissances nécessaires à une analyse rigoureuse des questions juridiques internationales. Ce programme associe une solide formation de base dans les domaines clés du droit international (création du droit international, règlement des différends internationaux, histoire et philosophie du droit) à une formation approfondie dans un ou plusieurs domaine(s) plus spécialisé(s), comprenant entre autres le commerce et les investissements, les droits de l'homme, l'environnement, la migration, les différends territoriaux ou la théorie du droit international.

The Master in International Law provides students with the skills and knowledge necessary for rigorous analysis of contemporary international legal issues. It couples a solid background in the main areas of international law (international law-making, international dispute settlement, history and philosophy of law) with advanced training in one or more specialised fields (including trade and investment, human rights, environment, migration, territorial disputes and international law theory).

Le présent plan d'études a été pensé selon une charge idéale de 30 crédits ECTS par semestre, afin que le quatrième semestre puisse être consacré à la seule rédaction du mémoire de master. L'étudiant a la possibilité d'étaler les cours optionnels sur les semestres 1 à 4 mais doit prendre en compte :

- la répartition des crédits entre les cours suivis dans la discipline de spécialisation et les cours suivis dans les disciplines complémentaires (voir la « structure générale » ci-dessus) ;
- l'obligation réglementaire d'obtenir, pour chaque semestre, un minimum de 18 crédits ECTS ;
- l'impossibilité de répéter un cours raté au quatrième semestre des études.

L'étudiant qui souhaite emprunter la filière rapide doit obtenir les 90 crédits d'enseignement requis par le plan d'études au terme du troisième semestre d'études. Au cours de ce dernier, il peut anticiper 6 crédits parmi les 18 crédits de cours optionnels prévus au programme du doctorat ; ce cours remplacera alors un cours optionnel prévu au programme de master.

Chaque étudiant a la possibilité d'effectuer, au cours de son troisième semestre d'études, un semestre d'échange hors les murs dans l'une de nos universités partenaires. Il peut alors transférer un maximum de 30 crédits ECTS.

This curriculum has been designed according to an ideal course load of 30 ECTS credits per semester, so that the fourth semester can be devoted to the writing of the Master dissertation. Each student is allowed to spread out the elective courses over semesters 1 to 4, but must take into account the following regulations:

- students must take a certain number of courses in their discipline of specialisation and in complementary disciplines (see outline above);
- it is obligatory for students to obtain a minimum of 18 ECTS credits each semester;
- failed courses cannot be repeated during the fourth semester of studies.

Students interested in the fast track option must obtain the 90 course credits required by the curriculum by the end of the third semester. During the third semester, these students can also take in advance 6 ECTS credits from the 18 ECTS credits of elective courses specified in the PhD curriculum; this course will replace an elective course offered in the master curriculum.

Students have the opportunity to spend the third semester at one of the Institute's partner

universities as part of its exchange programmes. At the end of this period abroad, these students will be able to transfer a maximum of 30 ECTS credits.

You can register to these courses with formal dispensation, under the condition not to exceed a cumulative total of 12 ECTS (on the whole four semesters) and to request authorisation from the Director of Studies office via a form available in the Internet Student Portal.

- it is obligatory for students to obtain a minimum of 18 ECTS credits each semester;
- failed courses cannot be repeated during the fourth semester of studies.

Students interested in the fast track option must obtain the 90 course credits required by the curriculum by the end of the third semester. During the third semester, these students must take in advance "Doctoral Seminar I", which is supposed to be taken in the first semester of the PhD programme; this course would replace an elective course offered in the master curriculum.

Students have the opportunity to spend the third semester at one of the Institute's partner universities as part of its exchange programmes. At the end of this period abroad, they will be able to transfer a maximum of 30 ECTS credits.

Il peut alors transférer un maximum de 30 crédits ECTS et doit, dans la mesure du possible, suivre un cours remplaçant «Statistics for International Relations Research I» prévu au troisième semestre du master.

Each student is allowed to spread out the elective courses over semesters 1 to 4, but must take into account the following regulations:

- Students must take a certain number of courses in their discipline of specialisation and in complementary disciplines;
- It is obligatory for students to obtain a minimum of 18 ECTS credits each semester;
- Failed courses cannot be repeated during the fourth semester of studies.

Students interested in the fast track option must obtain the 90 course credits required by the curriculum by the end of the third semester. During the third semester, these students can take in advance the "Doctoral Seminar"; this course will replace one of the elective courses included in the master programme curriculum.

Students have the opportunity to spend the third semester at one of the Institute's partner universities as part of its exchange programmes. At the end of this period abroad, these students will be able to transfer a maximum of 30 ECTS credits and, as far as possible, should have taken a substitute course for "Statistics for International Relations Research I", which is supposed to be taken in the third semester.

The complementary courses are the ones that you can choose from another disciplinary department or in the MIA and MDEV curricula, only if they are open to your department and subject to places being available. More specifically, you will be able to register to these courses online via Campus. These courses shouldn't be confused with courses taken outside of the curricula ("hors-plan" courses) which are usually not opened to your department, or courses taken in an academic institution (out of exchange programmes). You can register to these courses with formal dispensation, under the condition not to exceed a cumulative total of 12 ECTS (on the whole four semesters) and to request authorisation from the Director of Studies office via a form available in the internet Student Portal.

Doctorat en relations internationales/science politique

PhD in International Relations/Political Science

Le programme de doctorat en relations internationales/science politique prépare les doctorants à une carrière dans les relations internationales axée en grande partie sur la recherche. Le programme donne aux étudiants les outils nécessaires pour préparer leur thèse de doctorat et pour mener une recherche de haut niveau à l'issue de leurs études. Le plan d'études couvre, entre autres, l'économie politique, la gouvernance multilatérale, la théorie des jeux appliquée, la politique de sécurité, la réglementation environnementale, les conflits et la coopération, le genre, la violence politique, la souveraineté, l'ingérence humanitaire, les méthodes qualitatives et les statistiques.

The PhD programme in International Relations/Political Science is designed to prepare students for a career in international relations involving close contact with research. The programme gives students the range of skills needed to produce their doctoral thesis and to carry out and understand in-depth research after their studies. Courses cover political economy, multilateral governance, applied game theory, security policy, environmental regulation, conflict and cooperation, gender politics, political violence, sovereignty, intervention and humanitarianism, qualitative methods, statistics and other topics.
